JEKISS 'Jedem Kind seine Stimme" presentation

In the framework of the programme "JEKISS" (Each child her/his voice) 1500 children sing in children's choirs in 28 primary schools in Münster, Germany alone. Through the training of all school teachers - not just the music teachers - it is possible that 5600 school children are singing daily, not just within children's choirs. JEKISS has convinced more and more cities across Germany and is now practiced in 22 cities. Since 2008 1500 teachers have been trained and the programme was introduced in 60 presentations in Germany, Austria and Switzerland.

Ulrich will give a presentation on this unique way of incorporating music in school children's every day life with a special focus on the collaboration between music schools and schools.
